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Duty-free imports of medical, educational products approved

FINANCE Secretary Carlos Dominguez III has approved the Bureau of Customs (BOC) implementing rules and regulations (IRR) on tax- and duty-free importation of certain goods aimed at boosting the Philippines' healthcare capacity against COVID-19.

The IRR also includes provisions to facilitate "blended" or online learning system amid this global health crisis, the Department of Finance (DOF) said in a statement.

Customs Administrative Order (CAO) No. 12-2020 establishes the compliance system for importers and manufacturers entitled to avail exemption from import taxes, duties and fees as set under Republic Act (RA) No. 11494 or

the Bayanihan to Recover as One Act (Bayanihan 2).

The CAO details the products, equipment and supplies covered by the tax exemption under Bayanihan 2. On top of medical supplies, tax-exempt goods now include personal computers, laptops, tablets, or similar equipment appropriate for use in schools and donated for distribution to public schools, including state universities and colleges and vocational institutions under the Technical Education and Skills Development Authority.

The tax exemptions are effective until December 19, 2020.

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BOC sets rules on negotiated sale of forfeited goods

THE Bureau of Customs (BOC) has issued procedures for the disposition of abandoned and forfeited goods through negotiated sale.

Customs Memorandum Order (CMO) No. 26-2020 implements Customs Administrative Order (CAO) No. 03-2020, which provides BOC's new rules and procedures for all modes of disposition of seized, abandoned, and forfeited goods.

Aside from negotiated sale, other modes of disposition of seized, abandoned, and forfeited goods include public auction, donation, official use of BOC, re-exportation, destruction or condemnation, and turnover to the proper government agency.

CMO 26-2020 took effect October 9.

Goods that may be sold via negotiated sale are those which remain unsold after at least two public biddings, and are not suitable either for BOC's official use or for donation.

The negotiated sale must be approved by the finance secretary and in the presence of a Commission on Audit representative.

Under CAO 03-2020, prohibited from joining a negotiated sale are employees or officials of BOC; importers or consignees of the auctioned goods; defaulting offerors unable to comply with the payment requirements and those disqualified by ports for other infractions in the last 12 months; and offerors or their authorized representatives who are not present during the opening of the sealed offers, or

who fail to comply with the documentary requirements.

A negotiated sale is subject to the approval or disapproval of the Department of Finance, BOC's mother agency.

Under CMO 26-2020, a Negotiated Sale Committee (NSC) is created to implement the provisions of CAO 03-2020 on the conduct of negotiated sale. The NSC shall also conduct ocular inspection of the sale lots or items, and may reject or consider offers based on what is most advantageous to the interest of the government.

No minimum price will be set for offers, but CMO 26-2020 notes the government reserves the right to reject or accept offers, and to waive and require formalities.

A participant whose offer is accepted must pay a guarantee cash deposit equivalent to 20% of the offer within 24 hours of receipt of the NSC's notice of acceptance.

The remaining 80% of the offer should be paid in full within 48 hours from receipt of the NSC notice indicating the approval of the finance secretary. If the offer is rejected by the finance secretary, the guarantee cash deposit will be refunded 15 calendar days from receipt by the offeror of the notice of disapproval.

A negotiated sale is declared failed when there is no offer, or when the highest offeror fails to comply with CAO 03-2020 requirements. It is also considered failed when the offer is disapproved or rejected by the DOF. — *Roumina Pablo*

Customs deploys projects to stabilize E2M system

WHILE awaiting a new customs system, the Bureau of Customs (BOC) is implementing projects to stabilize and enhance the performance of its erratic Electronic-to-Mobile (E2M) System, and these efforts have borne results, according to the agency.

"The new customs system is still years away until implemented so we implemented projects to stabilize the current system until we acquire a new customs system," Management Information System and Technology Group (MISTG)-Technical Management Service officer-in-charge Jonathan Soriano said in a recent BOC webinar.

Heeding the suggestion of the World Bank (WB) in 2017, the customs bureau has undertaken a program to stabilize the E2M, the system which was implemented in 2005 on top of BOC's Automated System for Customs Data (Asycuda++), which in turn was installed 10 years earlier, in 1995.

Since then, the system had gotten no support and maintenance. The E2M now needs to be replaced because it has an

outdated infrastructure, a weak information security module, and an archaic risk management system.

Soriano noted that prior to the stabilization projects, the E2M system since 2013 has not been maintained, supported or upgraded by the contractor as it should have done. It is MISTG that has maintained the system despite lacking the capacity to address bugs and fix issues.

Soriano also said previous attempts by BOC to procure an upgraded or new system had failed.

"To compensate for the failed procurement of a new system, a maintenance and support project was acquired to keep the current E2M System operating until a new customs system is implemented," Soriano added.

Former MISTG deputy commissioner Jeffrey Ian Dy earlier said the stabilization project will enable E2M—which is incapable of parallel computing—to "survive in the next two, three years." These projects will address issues behind the slowdown of E2M through the conduct of archiving and redesigning of databases for backup

purposes. Dy noted that E2M's database has gotten so large that archiving is crucial to make the system operate faster.

Soriano said BOC has already acquired and implemented hardware and software systems as part of the stabilization project.

For software, BOC in June 2019 awarded its two-year E2M maintenance project, which includes data archiving and replacement of the Asycuda++ system.

BOC also awarded in August 2020 its Backup Network project, which provides network redundancy that can take over when the primary network goes down.

Soriano said that to improve the agency's information and communications technology (ICT) infrastructure, BOC has also made use of a private cloud environment to "provide an easily manageable, flexible and reliable high-capacity environment to host BOC systems and database."

Soriano said that with these enhancements, BOC has been able to implement several modules in the E2M System such as the Universal Risk Management System and Enhanced Value Verification System,

which were enforced in May and August 2020, respectively.

For the long term, BOC looks forward to the implementation of the Philippines Customs Modernization Project, which was proposed by WB in 2017. The project will modernize customs operations to improve BOC's core customs processing system, related technical infrastructure, and internal capacity in order to implement a sophisticated ICT that will enhance BOC's operations, integrity, accountability, and organizational performance.

The National Economic and Development Authority (NEDA) Board gave an "ad referendum approval" on May 27, 2020 for the proposed P5.5 billion modernization program of BOC.

The project, which seeks to improve Customs efficiency and reduce trade costs, was one of the options considered for the automation plan of the bureau. The project was approved March 6, 2020 by the NEDA Investment Coordination Committee Cabinet Committee. — *Roumina Pablo*

ICTSI steps up investment in Ecuador port

CONTECON Guayaquil S.A. (CGSA), a subsidiary of port operator International Container Terminal Services, Inc. (ICTSI), is investing US\$18 million to further develop the Port of Guayaquil in Ecuador.

With the investment, the port's capacity to handle neo-panamax vessels will be boosted in three stages, ICTSI said in a statement.

The first stage will raise the height of quay cranes 5 and 6 from 42 meters to 52 meters, and extend their boom lengths

from 50 meters to 56 meters (20 rows). The second stage involves works to reinforce docks, while the third stage will further deepen Pier 1's draft to 13.5 meters.

CGSA general manager José Antonio Contreras signed the investment contract with Ecuador's Minister of Transportation and Public Works Gabriel Martínez. Contreras said the investment is the two parties' joint commitment to develop the sector.

CGSA started servicing neo-panamax

vessels in 2019, becoming the first port in Ecuador capable of handling this large class of containerships following the dredging of the 95-kilometer access channel leading to the Port of Guayaquil.

Beyond the contract, CGSA plans to increase the total investment amount to \$30 million as part of its commitment to promote Ecuador's foreign trade.

In 2018, CGSA spearheaded the creation of the Logistics Community of the Port of Guayaquil, which provides supply

chain stakeholders with a platform for stronger collaboration. CGSA followed this with the launch of the first transport insurance program for Ecuador's banana trade in 2019 to protect growers and the industry. Banana is the country's main export product after petroleum.

CGSA has been operating at the Port of Guayaquil since 2007 under a 20-year concession. Last December, the Autoridad Portuaria de Guayaquil extended the concession period for another 20 years, allowing the company to operate until 2047.

Solon slams food price surge, calls for supply chain review

ALARMED by the sudden spike in food prices over the last month, Senator Francis Pangilinan called on government to revisit the supply food chain, with focus on logistics and transport bottlenecks.

Pangilinan in a statement said something is wrong when food prices are going up and people are going hungry even as farmers are producing more and demand exists. "*Mukhang sa transport o pagbyahe*

nagkakatalo [Transport seems to be the problem]," he said.

"The prices of food must go down. And this can be done with proper and enough transport," the former presidential

assistant on food security and agricultural modernization said.

Price monitoring reports from the Department of Agriculture (DA) revealed that a number of agricultural products have recently increased their prices substantially. Prices have gone up by as much

that importers or manufacturers need to comply with to avail of the tax breaks.

Depending on type of imported goods, importers or manufacturers may need to obtain regulatory clearances from the Food and Drug Administration, Department of Environment and Natural Resources, Department of Health, or other agencies.

On the other hand, imported health products for donation, certified by a regulatory agency or its accredited third party in the originating countries with established regulation, "shall automatically be cleared."

"The certification shall not be required for health products which are not subject to clearance from FDA," the CAO states.

The CAO likewise provides for the retroactive effectivity of the grant of tax exemptions on eligible imports beginning

June 25, 2020, or when RA 11469 or the Bayanihan to Heal as One Act (Bayanihan 1) expired.

For covered goods which arrived and were cleared by the BOC beginning June 25, the CAO allows for a refund of the taxes and duties paid, provided the importer secures a Tax Exemption Indorsement (TEI) from the DOF Revenue Office (RO). The amount of refund will be limited to the actual duties and taxes received by the BOC.

For speedy release of the medical supplies and equipment covered by the order, including foreign donations to a national government agency, the CAO states that the Joint Memorandum Order (JMO) on Relief Consignment and Customs Memorandum Order (CMO) No. 07-2020 on the Interim Procedure on the Provisional

Goods Declaration (PGD) and its related issuances will apply.

A PGD is a form of declaration allowing the tentative release of shipments when the declarant does not have all the information or supporting documents to complete the goods declaration. But the requirements must be submitted within the period prescribed by law.

Shipments entitled to exemption may be released under PGD, as long as a TEI from the DOF-RO is submitted within the period prescribed.

A copy of the CAO has yet to be issued by BOC as of press time.

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Cold storage facility guards authorized to disarm customs e-seal

SECURITY guards on duty at cold storages may disarm the customs electronic seals (ECS) on reefer containers to prevent delays that could affect the condition of perishable goods.

The authorization – contained in Bureau of Customs (BOC) Assessment and Operations Coordinating Group (AOCG) Memo No. 181-2020 – does away with the “assignment of customs guards by PID (Piers Inspection Division) for the disarming and unsealing of ECS”.

Nothing in AOCG Memo 181-2020, however, should be “construed as a delegation of the Bureau’s authority and control over imported goods entered through ports of entry nationwide”, the agency said.

The memo took effect on October 13, the same day it was signed by AOCG deputy commissioner Atty. Edward James Dy Buco.

The ECS is a GPS (global positioning system)-enabled sealing device or lock that physically secures a cargo and provides real-time information on its location.

The arming and disarming of ECS attached to import and export containers are part of BOC’s Web-based Electronic Tracking of Containerized Cargo (E-TRACC) System. The E-TRACC allows the agency to track, monitor, and audit the location and condition of cargoes, as well as obtain real-time alarms on, among others, diversion and tampering of cargoes.

Under Customs Memorandum Order (CMO) No. 04-2020, which establishes and implements the E-TRACC System,

authorized BOC personnel should be the ones to disarm/remove the ECS from the container.

Under AOCG Memo 181-2020, the assigned security guards should take visual evidence showing the container with the container number and with the ECS from either the shipping line or terminal operator still intact. Then they should transmit the information to the PID or equivalent office for the approval to end the trip, or the journey taken by the truck/container from origin to destination.

Prior to giving authorization to end the trip, the PID should get the name of the requesting security guard on duty, the time and date of the request, and a picture of the guard’s identification card or security guard license.

Once authorization is given, the security guard should disarm and manually remove the ECS from the container and hold it for safekeeping until retrieved by the E-TRACC team of the port.

The assigned examiner, prior to conducting the 100% physical examination, should check that the integrity of the container’s shipping or arrastre seal is still intact. Any signs the seal is broken or has been tampered with must immediately be reported. The 100% examination shall be immediately conducted by the assigned customs examiner, witnessed by representatives from concerned BOC offices and regulating agencies from the Department of Agriculture.

Under CMO 04-2020, an ECS is required during the transfer of cargo to a

container yard/container freight station (CY/CFS) or other CFWs; transit of cargo bound for Free Zones, inland customs office, depots, or terminals; transit of cargo to customs bonded warehouses (CBW); export of cargo from Free Zones, inland customs office, depots or terminals, and CBWs to port of loading; and transfer of shipments subject to further verification and/or monitoring.

All container vans covered by CMO 04-2020 should be affixed with an ECS before being cleared for departure from the starting point, or point of discharge for the voyage, to the end point, or point of destination.

Except when warranted under CMO 04-2020, full completion of customs cargo clearance is mandatory before any shipment is sealed with an ECS.

Booking an E-TRACC trip can be made one day earlier or up to one hour before departure of the container.

E-TRACC requires payment of P500 within a 10-kilometer (km) radius from

port of discharge and P700 beyond the 10-km radius from port of discharge. The charge covers both arming and disarming of the ECS.

E-TRACC is currently implemented for all containers—except those containing electronic materials—discharged from the Port of Manila, Manila International Container Port, and Port of Batangas that are covered by the transit single administrative document and bound for Laguna Technopark, Inc. and Cavite Economic Zone.

The system is also already being implemented in Davao and will also soon be implemented in Subic. Imports for other Philippine Economic Zone Authority economic zones will be covered by another customs memorandum.

BOC also recently activated its E-TRACC Monitoring Center manned by a team that will track the real-time location and status of containers to ensure these don’t deviate from their route. –

BOC Port of Manila inaugurates new building

THE Bureau of Customs (BOC) Port of Manila (POM) has inaugurated its new prefabricated office building that will house the collection district’s operations and administrative offices.

Construction of the new office building started after the historic Port of Manila building was razed by fire on February 22, 2019 and deemed unsafe for occupation.

Inaugurated on October 12, the 1,004-square-meter office space is a bi-level structure made of prefabricated materials that are designed for quick assembly and disassembly as needed, BOC said in a statement. It is designed to maximize flow of transactions to enhance efficiency and coordination among the occupants, with a centralized public address system installed to enable quick information dissemination.

BOC earlier said the prefabricated building cost an estimated P23.28 million.

Customs Commissioner Rey Guerrero lauded POM’s personnel for continuing to carry on their work in makeshift offices or in other BOC offices after their former building was destroyed.

BOC-POM district collector Michael Angelo Vargas said the collection district has changed its slogan from “Bangon POM” (Arise POM) to “Bagong POM” (New POM) with the opening of the new building.

NLEX-SCTEX toll plazas gear up for 100% RFID transactions on Nov 2

TOLL road operator NLEX Corp. is making several improvements at its toll plazas to ensure the smooth implementation of 100% RFID transactions on the North Luzon Expressway (NLEX) and Subic-Clark-Tarlac Expressway (SCTEX) starting November 2.

These physical and system improvements include installing 303 new canopy signages and 66 units of plaza lighting, NLEX Corp. said in a statement.

Of the 303 signages, 100 were installed in the first week of October and the remaining ones will be finished by December. In addition, pavement markings at the toll plazas will be repainted. The lane markings and signages will help direct traffic, while the lights will increase night visibility.

“As we fully transition to 100%

cashless transactions, motorists can expect more improvements and we will continue to ensure safety while delivering unmatched public service,” NLEX Corp. president and general manager J. Luigi L. Bautista said in a statement.

“We have ramped up our installation efforts and refinements in our systems and other innovations are being employed to provide efficient expressway travel experience to our customers,” he added.

The all-RFID toll collection system will be implemented on all expressways in the country by November 2, 2020 in line with Department Order 2020-012 issued by the Department of Transportation (DOTr).

Signed on August 13, DO 2020-012 directs the Toll Regulatory Board, Land

as P70 per kilogram for red onion, P40 per kilo for galunggong, and P10 per kilo for whole chicken, among others.

Rice prices also increased by P2 per kilo, even as palay is reportedly selling for a low of P12 per kilo in certain provinces.

The lawmaker suggested bridging the distance between consumer and producer, especially during this pandemic when going out of the house is still dangerous.

He noted some local government units (LGU) are already organizing community or mobile markets and markets on wheels, with LGUs themselves fetching from farmers food products and selling or making these available to their constituents.

"This is a big help in lowering food prices," Pangilinan pointed out.

Under Republic Act No. 11494 or the Bayanihan to Recover as One Act, LGUs

are allowed to procure agricultural products directly from farmers and fisherfolk or agricultural cooperatives and associations.

This direct food purchase by LGUs from farmers and cooperatives has resulted in over P6 billion in sales, a first in Philippine history, according to the DA.

"Dapat bigyang pansin ito at ang kita ng mga magsasaka at mangingisda [We should pay attention to this and the incomes of

our farmers and fisherfolk]. We will surely bring this up during the DA's budget deliberations," he added.

Bayanihan 2 also directs the adoption of measures to facilitate and improve supply chain movement and minimize disruptions to ensure essential goods, particularly food and medicine, are available.

Aside from improving the national end-to-end supply chain, it also calls for measures to reduce logistics costs "to the maximum extent possible," especially for basic commodities and services.

BOC Cebu sets up customer care center

THE Bureau of Customs (BOC) Port of Cebu formally opened its Customer Care Center (CCC), the 13th one-stop shop for customs services in the Philippines.

Inaugurated on October 12, the new CCC will be providing all types of customs services to port users, including centralized document receiving and releasing, gate pass issuances, and filing of goods declaration, among others.

"The CCC makes doing business with Customs simple, secure, and crucial in this time of pandemic, safe," BOC-Cebu acting district collector Charlito Martin Mendoza said in a statement.

He said that with the opening of the CCC, stakeholders can expect better and faster service from the customs collection district. It is also seen to boost the collection district's efficiency in time for the

anticipated increase in transactions for the Christmas season and gradual reopening of the economy.

BOC has been actively establishing CCCs nationwide to enhance trade facilitation and comply with Republic Act No. 11032, or the Ease of Doing Business and Efficient Government Service Delivery Act. The centers are also in compliance with the agency's zero-contact policy

discouraging face-to-face transactions to lessen opportunities for corruption.

Twelve more out of the 17 BOC collection districts have already established their own CCCs. These are the Port of Manila, Legazpi, Batangas, Surigao, Subic, Clark, Zamboanga, Davao, Limay, San Fernando, Iloilo, and Tacloban.

Still to open theirs are Aparri, Cagayan de Oro, Manila International Container Port, and Ninoy Aquino International Airport.

NLEX-SCTEX toll plazas gear up for 100% RFID...

Transportation Franchising and Regulatory Board, and Land Transportation Office to formulate new processes and procedures for the smooth implementation of cashless transactions on toll expressways.

DOTr earlier said the new policy will further protect the public from COVID-19 by promoting adherence to health protocols such as physical distancing through limiting human intervention, as well as removing traffic queues and congestion at toll plazas.

To further provide an updated look to the NLEX-SCTEX toll plazas, the toll canopies will be repainted and the toll lane status indicators showing open or closed status will be replaced with circular green and red cross (X) signals.

"More than the aesthetics, these

enhancements are necessary to keep our facilities in good condition and guide motorists as they head on to the expressways," Bautista added.

Meanwhile, realignment of the RFID sensors is underway on 32 NLEX-SCTEX toll lanes as part of the second phase of a project to enhance read range and detection. This system improvement covers the entry and exit lanes in Valenzuela, Marilao, Bocaue, Tambobong, Balagtas, San Fernando, Tarlac, and Tipa. Last July, the tollway company completed the realignment of sensors in 100 toll lanes.

NLEX is likewise converting this October the Tambobong, Pulilan, Mexico, Karuhatan Interchange, Sta. Rita, San Miguel (Hacienda Luisita), Concepcion, Clark South A&B, and Tipa toll plazas

into exclusive RFID lanes. It has already converted the Dau, Porac, Mabiga, Lawang Bato Northbound Entry, and Philippine Arena toll plazas, and expansion lanes in Balintawak and Bocaue toll plazas.

Apart from these improvements, Easytrip RFID installation sites have been increased to accommodate the rising number of motorists availing of the RFID. Around 31 sites have opened so motorists can get their free RFID stickers more easily and conveniently.

To apply for an Easytrip RFID, motorists may visit the installation sites along NLEX-SCTEX, fill out the subscription form then pay the initial load of P500 for Class 1 vehicles, and P1,000 for Class 2 and 3 vehicles. Motorists are also encouraged to fill out the subscription form online

through www.easytrip.ph.

Once installed, NLEX and SCTEX RFID users will be able to traverse other Metro Pacific Tollways-owned expressways like the Manila-Cavite Expressway (CAVITEX) and Cavite-Laguna Expressway (CALAX).

Reloading the RFID can be done onsite and online. Motorists may reload via the Easytrip mobile application, which is available for both Android and iOS phones, and through online reloading partners such as PayMaya, Eon, GCash, Bancnet, Mastercard, Visa, UCPB, BPI, Metrobank, BDO, Coins.ph, and Smart Money.

Reloading can also be done at reloading sites, select gas stations, and bills payment centers at the malls.

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
