New container output to jump 40% in 2021 amid strong cargo demand: study

- The unprecedented number of blanked sailings by carriers in the second quarter, not inadequate container fleet, led to the current shortage in empty containers
- Despite the surge in global cargo demand in the second half of the year, data shows sufficient container equipment fleet to support ongoing demand
- Demand for new containers remains strong and factories are reporting full orderbooks through the first half of 2021
- Newbuild output in 2021 is forecast to leap by as much as 40% with further growth seen

in subsequent years

THE current container shortage is not caused by insufficient equipment fleet but by disruptions in shipping supply chains due to "the unprecedented number of blanked sailings" by shipping lines, according to Drewry's latest Container Equipment Forecaster.

In the report, the maritime transport research service underscored that box equipment shortages, which are restricting available capacity and forcing freight rates to record highs, are "being driven by empty container repositioning issues rather than inadequate fleet."

The global container equipment fleet

NCR, 9 other areas under GCQ in Jan

- Metro Manila, Batangas, Iloilo City, Tacloban City, Lanao Del Sur, Iligan City, Davao City, and Davao Del Norte remain under general community quarantine (GCQ) for January
- Isabela and its city of Santiago also under GCQ
- All other areas in the country placed on modified GCQ status

METRO Manila, Batangas, Iloilo City, Tacloban City, Lanao Del Sur, Iligan City, Davao City, and Davao Del Norte will remain under general community quarantine (GCQ) from January 1 to 31, 2021.

Isabela and its city of Santiago are also placed under GCQ for January, President Rodrigo Duterte announced in a late night public address televised on December 28.

All other areas in the country will remain under the less stringent modified GCQ (MGCQ).

The quarantine classifications are still subject to local government units' (LGU) appeal for change.

In GCQ areas, the logistics sector is allowed to operate at full capacity, according to the latest omnibus guidelines on the implementation of community quarantines.

BOC foils illegal export of rare agarwood

- Bureau of Customs (BOC) prevented the illegal export of six boxes of agarwood worth P62 million
- The packages were declared to contain "woodcrafts" and bound for Vietnam via NAIA
- X-ray scanning and physical inspection revealed 73 kilograms of agarwood chips set to be illegally exported without the necessary permits from DENR
- The seized packages will be subjected to seizure and forfeiture proceedings

THE Bureau of Customs (BOC) has prevented another attempt to smuggle agarwood as it foiled the illegal exportation of six boxes of the rare and expensive type of wood worth P62 million.

The close coordination between the BOC collection districts of Port of Davao and Ninoy Aquino International Airport (NAIA), Davao International Airport (DIA), Philippine National Police-Aviation Security Group, and Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) Region XI on December 24 resulted in the seizure of the six boxes of agarwood.

The packages were initially declared to contain "woodcrafts," and were bound for Vietnam via NAIA, BOC said in a statement.

X-ray scanning and physical inspection, however, revealed the packages actually contained 73 kilograms (kg) of agarwood chips for illegal exportation to Vietnam without the necessary permits from DENR, BOC said.

The seized packages will undergo seizure and forfeiture proceedings for violation of Section 117 (Regulated Shipments), Section 1400 (Misdeclaration) and Section 1113 (Property Subject to Seizure and Forfeiture) of Republic Act (RA) No. 10863, or the Customs Modernization and Tariff Act, in relation to Section 27 (i) [Illegal Transport] of RA 9147, or the Wildlife Resources Conservation and Protection Act.

The seized agarwood will be turned over to DENR.

In two separate seizures earlier this month, BOC also intercepted three packages containing 28 kg of agarwood worth P2.4 million in a warehouse in Pasay City, and a shipment of 671 pieces of agarwood chips worth P1.72 million. Both packages and shipment of agarwood were to be exported without proper permits.

DENR earlier stressed that selling of agarwood or lapnis from the Philippines is illegal.

Agarwood is found only in the heart of the jungles of Mindanao and Visayas and is classified under the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Flora and Fauna and included in the National List of Threatened Philippine Plants per DENR Administrative Order No. 2007-01.

Agarwood produces a resin that is valued for its distinctive fragrance and is formed when the host tree becomes infected with a mold called *Phialophora parasitica*. The mold infection makes the tree produce a dark aromatic resin called aloes or aga in its heartwood. The fragrant resin is used to make incense, perfume, and medicinal products particularly in the Middle East and Asia.

BOC noted that foreigners are said to hike to remote villages in the Philippines to

Skyway Stage 3 connecting SLEX with NLEX partly opens on Dec 29

- Skyway Stage 3 partially opens on December 29
- Toll waived for a month
- Connecting SLEX with NLEX, Skyway Stage 3 also serves as an alternative thoroughfare to EDSA, with its eight access points that traverse Makati, Manila, San Juan, and Quezon City

THE 18-kilometer (km) Skyway Stage 3, which links South Luzon Expressway (SLEX) and North Luzon Expressway (NLEX), will be partially opened on December 29, with motorists allowed to use the thoroughfare toll-free for a month.

"I am pleased to announce the partial opening tomorrow, December 29, of our 18-km Skyway Stage 3, for free to motorists for one month. By January 14, we can all enjoy the full benefits of this engineering marvel," Ramon Ang, president and chief operating officer of concessionaire San Miguel Corp. (SMC), said in a statement.

Over a year ago, SMC also partially opened the Buendia to Plaza Dilao section of Skyway Stage 3, which remains open and free for use by the public.

Skyway Stage 3, which took six years to complete due to numerous challenges, including right-of-way issues and major

changes to its design and alignment, is seen to greatly improve travel times and traffic conditions in and around Metro Manila.

Connecting SLEX with NLEX, it will also serve as an alternative to EDSA, with its eight access points that traverse Makati, Manila, San Juan, and Quezon City.

These access points are Buendia, Plaza Dilao, Nagtahan, Aurora Blvd., Quezon Ave., Sgt. Rivera, Balintawak, and NLEX.

Skyway 3, which was privately funded and built by SMC, was completed at no cost to government, and with no guarantees or subsidies.

Ang earlier said Skyway 3 will not only improve the daily commutes of Filipinos but will also fast track transportation of goods from north and south Luzon.

The P10-billion Skyway Extension Project, meanwhile, will be completed by February 2021. The project, construction of which was halted for a time last month due to an accident, will extend the Skyway

from Susana Heights on SLEX to Sucat in Parañaque and back, and will provide direct access to the elevated section of the Skyway.

It will connect SLEX and Muntinlupa Cavite Expressway to the Skyway

at Susanna Heights, bypassing Alabang, to shorten travel from south to north via the Skyway System. The project, started in late 2019, will also eliminate traffic buildup along SLEX heading to Alabang and the Alabang viaduct.

Duterte signs P4.5T national budget for 2021

- President Rodrigo Duterte has signed into law the P4.5 trillion national budget for 2021
- The 2021 national budget is 10% larger than the 2020 appropriations and is the country's largest annual budget to date
- Social services accounts for the largest bulk of the 2021 budget with a 37% share, followed by economic services with 29.4% and general public services with 16.6%
- The 2021 budget also provides funding for the Department of Transportation's rail transport program, land public transportation program, and maritime infrastructure program

Philippine President Rodrigo Duterte on December 28 signed into law the P4.506 trillion national budget for 2021, which is 10% larger than appropriations for 2020 and is the country's largest annual budget to date.

The 2021 General Appropriations Act aims to help the nation reset by addressing the COVID-19 pandemic, to rebound by boosting infrastructure development and by generating job opportunities, and to rebuild by assisting communities adapt to post-pandemic life, according to the Department of Budget and Management (DBM).

The social services sector accounts for the largest portion of the 2021 budget with a P1.668 trillion funding, or 37% of the total.

The economic services sector, which

includes the administration's flagship Build, Build, Build infrastructure program, will receive the second highest allocation of P1.323 trillion or 29.4%.

The general public services sector will be allocated P747.8 billion (16.6%), debt burden P560.2 billion (12.4%), and defense P206.8 billion (4.6%).

In terms of departments, the Department of Education will continue to receive the largest portion of the budget with P751.7 billion, or 16.7% of the total.

The Department of Public Works and Highways (DPWH) and the Department of Interior and Local Government follow with allotments of P695.7 billion (15.4%) and P249.3 billion (5.5%), respectively.

The Department of Health will receive P210.2 billion, which is 19.6% of the total,

followed by the Department of National Defense with P205.8 billion, Department of Social Welfare and Development with P176.9 billion, Department of Transportation (DOTr) with P87.9 billion, Department of Agriculture with P71.0 billion, the Judiciary with P45.3 billion, and the Department of Labor and Employment with P37.1 billion.

For infrastructure projects under the DPWH, some P317.7 billion will be implemented for its core programs, particularly asset preservation (P66 billion), network development (P124.5 billion), bridge program (P25.4 billion) and flood management (P101.8 billion).

There will also be funding support for the DOTr's rail transport program (P47.7 billion), land public transportation program (P12.64 billion), and maritime infrastructure program (P562.41 million) for next year.

DOTr places P367B order for MM subway train cars

- The Department of Transportation (DOTr) signed a P367-billion contract for the provision of rolling stock for the Metro Manila Subway Project (MMSP) Phase 1 by a Japanese joint venture contractor
- The contract includes the design, supply, installation, construction, testing, and commissioning of 240 train cars for the subway project
- A single train of the MMSP would have a maximum capacity of 2,242 passengers and potentially remove up to 1,300 cars, 220 jeepneys, or 60 buses from Metro Manila roads

THE Department of Transportation (DOTr) has signed a contract for the supply of 240 train cars for the Metro Manila Subway Project (MMSP) by a Japanese joint venture (JV) contractor.

DOTr and the JV of Japan Transport Engineering Co. and Sumitomo Corp. signed on December 21 Contract Package 107 on providing the rolling stock for the MMSP Phase 1.

The contract was virtually signed by Transportation Secretary Arthur Tugade and Sumitomo Corp. general manager for social infrastructure business division Hidemasa Kozawa.

The contract, with a total approved cost of almost P367 billion and financed by Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA), includes the design, supply, installation, construction, testing, and commissioning of 240 train cars for the subway project.

"Indeed, the sustainable solution to our traffic congestion is a buildup of our mass transportation network, including with high capacity train lines," DOTr undersecretary for railways Timothy John Batan said in a statement.

He said that the arrival of the first tunnel boring machine in January 2021 and the ceremonial contract signing for the subway's 30 eight-car train sets put the DOTr "on track to delivering the Metro Manila Subway, a pipe dream for almost five decades, that is now turning into a reality."

Batan said a single train of the MMSP would have a maximum capacity of 2,242 passengers and would potentially remove up to 1,300 cars, 220 jeepneys, or 60 buses from Metro Manila roads.

Once completed and fully operational, the MMSP will be an expansive 36-kilometer railway system with 15 stations starting from Quirino Highway in Quezon City and ending at Ninoy Aquino International Airport (NAIA) Terminal 3 in Pasay City and Food Terminal Inc. (FTI) in Taguig City, in the process

crossing seven local governments and passing through three of Metro Manila's business districts.

The underground rail line is expected to serve 370,000 passengers daily in its first year of full operations, and is targeted to be partially operable by 2021.

The subway project aims to ease traffic congestion, meet fast-rising transport demand, and reduce air pollution in the country's premier urban center.

A flagship project under the administration's Build, Build, Build infrastructure

We Take Care of Our Own

SCMAP PERSPECTIVE

BACK in May the Department of Trade and Industry released a video paying tribute to those working in the logistics sector, recognizing their role in delivering essential goods to locked down Filipinos and keeping the economy going (as much as possible, at the very least) amidst community quarantine. Port workers, warehouse personnel and delivery riders got the spotlight, as videos of them continuing to work - with safety protocols in place, of course - were played to illustrate how they are just as important as medical frontliners during those first difficult weeks.

It's been ten months since the first community lockdowns were declared, and we still need our logistics workers more than ever. Well, to be frank, we've always relied on them, in good times and bad; however, the work is not glamorous, at least not glamorous enough to be shown on television. It's the sort of work one can take for granted, for as long as he is able to go to the supermarket to buy a week's worth of supplies, or is able to go online and buy a K-pop album and not worry about it until it arrives. Arguably, it's the sort

of work one should take for granted. The customer should not have to worry (constantly) about how his order is delivered and when, for as long as it gets to him in the right time, at the right condition, and at the right price.

So it's really up to us in the industry, then, to make sure that our logistics workers are taken care of. Whether working in-house or outsourced, they make sure our businesses continue to operate despite the circumstances, and are able to serve its customers as their habits change and evolve with the times.

On the surface, this means giving them peace of mind, that they are not unknowingly spreading the coronavirus to their families and colleagues. I assume most of these measures are already in place: health protocols, alternative working arrangements, perhaps a contact tracing scheme. This should also mean providing them the support needed to ensure they can still do their work: transportation services, increased allowances for the additional burden on home utilities (ergo, you pay for the additional electricity cost, ideally), or perhaps more flexible working arrangements for those who have to stay at home and, therefore, find themselves juggling employee and family duties.

In the longer term, we should also be thinking of how we're compensating

our logistics workers. What constitutes "support" has changed significantly in the past few months, as we find the lines between home and work life blurring, and we expect far more of our people. For businesses, it is a difficult line to toe. Profits have taken a hit, and while logistics have been allowed to operate as normal for the most part, the continuing doldrums of our economy means things won't go "back to normal", whatever that now means, at least for the next few years. Yet we cannot afford to lose our people, to whom we rely on more than ever. But, again, they are people too, not just automatons: they are also stressed out by the circumstances and are worried about whether they can still provide for their families down the line.

And it isn't all about financial considerations. Are we giving our people the opportunity to learn on the job, to upskill and further themselves? Are we supporting them through decisive and kind leadership that empowers and motivates them to go above and beyond what's expected, rather than just forcing them to deliver? Are we broadening their horizons, or are we restricting their view? These considerations go a long way not just to retain our people, but also to attract new ones - to shake off those pesky perceptions of logistics jobs, particularly those in the frontlines, as temporary ones you just pass through on your way up the career ladder.

We have to be more sensitive to these factors, and not just while we are in this pandemic. Much like our customers' preferences are evolving with the times,

our employees' needs are, too - and they will not revert back to what they were. In these times when we demand more of our people, we must also recognize that our people also demand more of us. We have to take care of our own, as we take care of our customers.

Finally, I do acknowledge that businesses can only do so much, and that part of the response to make sure we can truly support our logistics workers lies with the government. As I write this, proposals putting in place a 14-day "pandemic leave" are making their way through the legislature - but, again, we must make sure measures supporting our workers are not made with the thinking that we can do away with it once the pandemic is over. For example, the riders delivering for the likes of Grab, Foodpanda and others - how are they protected by law? The question of whether they are "employees" or "freelance contractors" have been tackled in other cities and countries; last month in California, a measure passed defining such drivers as the latter, in a campaign supported heavily by Uber and Lyft. These questions will pop up here sooner or later, as we rely on them even more to bring some sense of normality in our middle-of-the-pandemic, almost-continuously-cooped-up lives.

The road, rail, maritime, and aviation sectors of public transportation are also allowed to operate at reduced operational and vehicular capacity in accordance with the guidelines issued by the Department of Transportation (DOTr).

All public transport vehicles should also observe a strict one-meter distance between passengers and put appropriate engineering controls in place.

MGCQ, which is the transition phase

to the “new normal,” has more relaxed measures than GCQ in terms of limiting movement and transportation, regulating the operations of industries, and fielding uniformed personnel to enforce community quarantine protocols.

Road, rail, maritime, and aviation sectors of public transportation will be allowed to operate at a capacity based on guidelines issued by the DOTr.

Private transportation will also be allowed, again subject to DOTr guidelines.

Within and across areas placed under any form of community quarantine, movement of all types of cargoes via land, air, and sea should remain unhampered. Likewise, workers in the logistics sector, such as cargo, trucking, courier delivery and port operations, should be allowed to transit across areas placed under any form of community quarantine.

All LGUs are directed

to strictly abide by this national policy, provided that only up to five personnel may operate cargo and delivery vehicles by land, with or without load.

LGUs and local health units are also enjoined not to issue orders contrary to or inconsistent with said directive.

New container output to jump 40%...

is expected to end the year with a 1.1% decline to 39.9 million TEUs, compared to a 3.3% projected fall in 2020 global container port handling.

“This suggests that the former has more than kept pace with the latter,” said Drewry.

However, while the first half of the year was dominated by a severe trade contraction when carriers blanked record sailings, the second half was marked by a surprising recovery in cargo demand.

Drewry estimates that global container port throughput declined almost 6% in the first half of 2020 and boomed over 10% through the final six months of the year.

Sufficient equipment fleet

But despite this unexpected surge in port throughput in the second half of the year, data shows there is sufficient equipment fleet to support ongoing cargo demand.

“Rather, it is the disruption to container supply chains wrought by the unprecedented number of blanked sailings, which reached as high as 30% of sailings on some trades back in 2Q20, that led to the current shortage of empty contain-

ers in key cargo demand centres such as China,” said Drewry

Nonetheless, the surge in cargo demand has boosted investment in new container equipment. From a 35% contraction in global output in the first half, manufacturing has since recovered and is expected to reach 2.67 million TEUs by the end of the year, down 5% on 2019, according to the forecaster.

But with demand for new containers remaining strong and factories reporting full orderbooks well into the first half of 2021, output in 2021 is forecast to leap as much as 40% with further growth anticipated in subsequent years.

Newbuild prices increased rapidly in the third quarter of this year, rising from US\$2,050 to \$2,100 per 20-foot dry box in early July to \$2,500 at the end of the quarterly period in September.

Meanwhile, in October prices as high as \$2,650 per 20-foot standard dry freight container were being quoted.

With manufacturing capacity fully utilized, further price increases are expected, Drewry said. Correspondingly, lease rates hardened in the third quarter of 2020 as demand for containers increased and equipment utilization levels improved.

The rally in lease rates is expected to continue.

“The ramp up of newbuild production will certainly help alleviate some of the ongoing container equipment shortages,” Drewry said.

But what will really improve the situation is when cargo demand development and carrier sailing schedules normalize, “as Covid-19 related disruption unwinds through the first half of 2021.”
